MINUTES OF WINCHESTER U3A ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD IN LITTLETON MEMORIAL HALL AT 14.30 ON 14th MARCH 2023

1. WELCOME:

Bob Shemilt, Chairman, welcomed 83 members to the meeting.

2. APOLOGIES:

Belinda Ward, Chris Peck, Margaret Boyden, Marjorie Patient

3. MINUTES of Annual General Meeting held on 10th May 2022: These were accepted.

4. MATTERS ARISING from the minutes: None.

5. CHAIRMAN'S REPORT:

Bob Shemilt thanked Freda Bates (Vice-chairman) for her generous and valuable help as he took on the vacant position of Chairman. He also thanked David Boddy (Secretary) for his work over the past three years. The meetings on Zoom had been interesting and had helped to keep the group going. The experiment with meeting in the city centre had been worth trying, and is now part of our regular pattern, especially useful for those who find it difficult to travel to Littleton. The meeting unanimously approved the Chairman's report

6. TREASURER'S REPORT AND ACCOUNTS:

Vernon Tottle had published the accounts on the website and in the Newsletter. He noted that the bank balance shown in the accounts was quite high, partly because during lockdown members had continued to pay their subscription, but we had not been able to hold meetings and therefore pay speakers.

Rising costs will inevitably reduce the surplus this year, but we are still likely to be in a good financial position. He invited anyone with questions about the accounts to approach him afterwards, so as not to delay the day's speaker. He then proposed that the meeting accept the accounts, which it did unanimously.

He also thanked David Smith for his work as Independent Financial Examiner.

Joan Sherrin proposed a vote of thanks to the Treasurer for all his work, and to the rest of the committee for all the work they do for the membership. The meeting responded with applause.

7. ELECTION OF COMMITTEE FOR 2023-2024:

Joan Sherrin had been nominated and seconded as Chair, Ann Edwards as vice-Chair and Susan Shannon as Secretary. Julia Whitburn has resigned, but all other members of the current committee are prepared to serve another year and were unanimously re-elected as follows: Vernon Tottle (Treasurer), Barry Brinkman (Webmaster), Marion Schiesser (Membership), Nick Vernon (Speakers), John Craig (Groups) and Freda Bates.

Bob then declared the formal meeting closed at 14.45, and the afternoon continued with the usual monthly talk.

I met him over fifteen years ago. Our wives had been diagnosed with dementia and we got talking over coffee at a drop-in centre. So, there was a common bond and it grew over the years as our spouses both succumbed to one of the cruellest of diseases.

Nick and I would meet for lunch about once a month at one of the many pubs in the Winchester area, to put the world to rights [we could probably have compiled our own "Good Pubs Guide"!]. And, of course, we talked about our problems and supported each other.

Over one of those lunches I asked him if he was a member of U3A. I had joined back in 2003 and had been a committee member and chairman. It was one of the best decisions of my life and I told him it would be the same for him. Being the man he was he not only joined but became actively involved in Questers, and in the Apple Mac group. More recently, he joined the Committee as a very effective Speakers Secretary. He will be greatly missed.

Nick leaves behind a devoted wife, Pauline, and a loving family - daughter, Carol and sons, Matthew and Graham – to whom I offer my sympathy on behalf of U3A.

All that remains for me to say is: Goodbye old friend. It was a privilege knowing you.

Monthly Talk Report by Nicola Giles

January monthly talk: The Meanest Millionaire (John Paul Getty).

The first talk of the New Year was well attended. Dr Anne Anderson fortunately made it back from Philadelphia the day before!

It was amazing to hear how much Art and antiquities were acquired by JP Getty and later by the Getty foundation. The Getty Villa built in the style of a grand roman villa was completed in 1974, unfortunately he never got to visit his museum although he died 2 years after completion.

The Getty Centre Museum on the other hand is a striking modern building, both in Los Angeles. The artworks range from Renaissance to Pop Art and antiquities, Elgin marbles and statues. Some purchases came with provenance, others had to be repatriated after illegal looting. The Artwork was then bought back from the reunited owners. Art and money go together in America apparently. Art purchased is tax deductible. Much Artwork was acquired when the great country houses of the UK had to raise funds either to pay death duties or essential maintenance; they were able to outbid the British. Whole Parisian rooms were bought and recreated, French gilded furniture was a favourite.

The two main indications of his meanness we learned was he reportedly wore empty tissue boxes for slippers and when his grandson was kidnapped he would only stump up \$2.2 million, not the full amount demanded, as that was tax deductible. It was only a loan. He charged the family 8% interest! Getty was actually worth \$6billion on his death.
